Group A

- 1. The triptych structure of *To the Lighthouse* was explained by Virginia Woolf as "two blocks joined by a corridor". Critically comment on Woolf's statement and also the naming of the three sections in the novel.
- 2. Discuss Greene's use of the elements of espionage fiction in A Gun for Sale
- 3. Comment on the elements of an underlying colonial discourse in And Then There Were None.
- 4. Discuss how Right Ho, Jeeves is different from the other works of fiction of the interwar period.

Group B

- 5. How do disability and war reshape the norms of familial behaviour? Justify your answer with suitable textual references.
- 6. Discuss with suitable references how the War features in the stories of D.H. Lawrence.
- 7. "The fact is, Watson, that this gentleman upon the sofa was a bit too good for our people. He was in a class by himself." Locate these lines and critically comment on the significance of these lines to the story
- 8. "He almost laughed as he thought what a fool R. had made of him." Comment on Maugham's cynical representation of the espionage system during the War with reference to the stories you have read.
