- 1. In Hasek's novel, is Svejk representative of a general Czech incomprehension and apathy about the war, or does he act alone? Give reasons for your answer.
- 2. In *The Periodic Table*, Primo Levi wrote: 'Chemistry led to the heart of the Matter, and Matter was our ally precisely because the Spirit, dear to Fascism, was our enemy.' How do you think Levi's training as a chemist enabled him to confront and bear witness to the realities of Fascism and Nazism?
- 3. How does St-Exupéry reconcile the conflicting pulls of freedom and duty in *Night Flight*? Discuss.
- 4. 'Precisely because Solaris cannot be assimilated into human history (because it does not signify any new path of historical development), it represents a void into which all human hypotheses fall. Its discovery is a pure negative apocalypse.' Comment.
- 5. In an interview, Elfride Jelinek referred to the women who carry on their backs 'the high culture Austria so idolizes. ... A woman who cannot partake in life or in desire. Even the right to watch is a masculine right, the woman is always the one who is watched, never the one who watches'. Examine the sexual choices made by Erika Kohut in *The Piano Player* in the light of this statement.
