- 1. Comment on Charles Darwin's dramatic portrayal of natural warfare in *On the Origin of Species*.
- 2. Can we read *Middlemarch* as an account of 'the history of man' as well as an investigation into 'how that mysterious admixture behaves under the varying experiments of Time'? Justify your answer.
- 3. Roger Hamley's character in *Wives and Daughters* allows Elizabeth Gaskell to offer a sophisticated examination of how evolutionary biology contributed to political and social change in the era of the first Reform Bill. Comment.
- 4. Darwin's own vision of humankind's reduction of 'nature' to an 'abnormal' state of artifice closely resembles Bronte's in its contempt for the human ignorance of the subtler design of Nature. Consider *Wuthering Heights* in the light of this remark.
- 5. In *The Water Babies*, Charles Kingsley uses Darwinian ideas to comment on the Malthusian order of things. Elucidate.
- 6. How are gender relations explained in Bulwer-Lytton's *The Coming Race?* Answer with suitable examples.
- 7. Thomas Hardy's *Two on a Tower* chooses personal relationships as the novel's proper subject and asserts that scientific matters lie outside the purview of fiction. Do you agree? Give reasons for your answer.
- 8. Comment on H. G. Wells's use of time as a fourth dimension in *The Time Machine*
