Answer any two questions. All questions carry equal marks

- 1. In its preoccupation with myth, fantasy, and the occult, does *The Master and Margarita* deliberately break with the protocols of modernist fiction? Give reasons for your answer.
- 2. In the Periodic Table, Levi wrote: 'The trade of chemist (justified in my case by the experience of Auschwitz) teaches you to overcome, indeed to ignore, certain revulsions that are neither necessary nor congenital: matter is matter, neither noble or vile, infinitely transformable; and its proximate origin is of no importance whatsoever'. In light of this statement, comment on how Levi deploys the scientist's objectivity as a narrative tool.
- 3. In *Night Flight*, St-Exupéry simultaneously draws attention to the romance and heroism associated with the solitary pilot, and the iron discipline under which he has to operate. Are these two impulses compatible? Discuss.
- 4. '[T]he philosophical thrust of *Solaris* is not merely to estrange. It also takes as its very subject matter the category of estrangement, the relationship...between the familiar and the other, between identity and alterity; and it explores the functions and limits of cognition itself in coming to terms with this relationship'. Comment.
- 5. 'In *The Piano Player*, Jelinek locates the root of Austrian fascism in the family'. Discuss.
