(a) Pollock's Komagata Maru Incident clearly brings to light Canada's insensitivity and lack of awareness about the bigger world that lies outside Canada as it focuses on the faulty and exclusionist immigration laws that Canada implemented from time to time in order to retain its whiteness. — Discuss.

(b) *Princess Pocahontas and the Blue Spots* foregrounds moments when the power of dominant societies and cultures can be deflected, annulled, or appropriated. Discuss critically with suitable examples.
