- 1. What were the key observations and experiences that led Charles Darwin to formulate his theory of evolution by natural selection?
- 2. What was the reception of Charles Darwin's ideas within the scientific community and society at large, and how did his theories impact subsequent scientific research and intellectual discourse?
- 3. How does Bulwer Lytton's portrayal of a highly advanced and evolved humanoid race in *The Coming Race* reflect or diverge from Darwin's theories on human evolution?
- 4. How does George Eliot's *Middlemarch* explore the tension between scientific rationality and the complexities of human emotions and moral choices?
- 5. In what ways does Elizabeth Gaskell incorporate Darwinian principles into the portrayal of female characters in *Wives and Daughters*?
- 6. How does Charles Kingsley's novel *The Water Babies* explore the themes of transformation and moral growth? What deeper philosophical or moral ideas does Kingsley convey through the allegorical journey of the protagonist?
- 7. How does the setting of the moors in *Wuthering Heights* mirror the harsh, competitive nature of the natural world and the themes of power and dominance within the story?
- 8. What parallels can be drawn between the predatory nature of vampires in Bram Stoker's *Dracula* and the natural world as described by Darwin's theories on evolution and survival of the fittest?
- 9. In H. G. Wells' *The Time Machine*, how does water in the time traveller's narrative become a redemptive motif?
