Answer any three of the following questions. All questions carry equal marks.

- 1. Critically analyse the English Romantic poets' movement away from the concerns of eighteenth-century topographical poetry? How would you read their rejection, of the subordination of nature to ethical and political reflection, in favour of experience in a full way?
- 2. Comment on the theme of the superiority of nature to art in Joseph Warton's 'The Enthusiast: or the Lover of Nature'.
- 3. Examine the significance of Burke's distinction of the Beautiful and the Sublime to the aesthetic theories and artistic practices of Romanticism. Answer with reference to the relevant sections of *A Philosophical Enquiry into the Origin of our Ideas of the Sublime and Beautiful*.
- 4. Would you agree that Gilpin's theories of the picturesque are not really concerned with the political but the aesthetic? Answer with reference to his essay 'On Picturesque Beauty'.
- 5. Analyse Wordsworth's reconciliation with nature through his poetic consciousness in 'Tintern Abbey'? What are the broader implications of this reconciliation to the political stability of the English nation?
- 6. Examine the 'dark side' of European Romanticism and its complicity with the imperial intent in Coleridge's 'Kubla Khan'.
- 7. How does Clare reclaim the authority of the 'peasant poet' with regard to landscape in poems like 'The Mores' and 'Remembrances'? How does it introduce a fresh perspective in the dominant mode of eighteenth-century loco-descriptive poetry?
- 8. How does Thelwall propose the synthesis of aesthetic contemplation and political activism in depicting the 'dark side of the rural landscape' in his Preface to *The Peripatetic*?
