KLO militant surrenders in West Bengal

KOLKATA, DEC. 24. A day after the Chief Minister, Buddhadeb Bhattacharjee, called the militants of the Kamtapur Liberation Organisation (KLO), one of the militant groups in north Bengal, to surrender, a top-ranking leader of the outfit responded by turning himself to police.

Himadri alias Madhusudan alias Tarzan, surrendered to police on December 22, the day Mr. Bhattacharjee announced at a rally in Coochbehar in north Bengal that his Government would consider lifting the cases against the KLO militants who surrendered unconditionally.

The Chief Minister also indicated that the other extremist outfit of the region, the Kamtapur People's Party, could act as broker between the KLO and the Government. And he was also willing to discuss the socio-economic problems of the area with the KPP leaders.

Himadri was close to the KLO's second-incommand, Mihir Das alias Milton and was one of the 38 KLO activists who had undergone arms training in Bhutan.

According to police, he decided to give up extremism and join the mainstream after he heard Mr. Bhattacharjee's offer. He even decided to urge the Chief Minister to provide him with a job.

The KPP, however, made it clear that it would consider opening a dialogue with the Government only if the latter agreed to free the KPP activists currently in jail.

The KPP has been campaigning in the district for a long time for recognition of the Rajbanshi dialect. The movement took a new colour when the militant KLO appeared on the scene in 1996. Several functionaries of the CPI (M) and the

The Superintendent of Police, Jalpaiguri, Siddhinath Gupta, said that Himadri had left the Bhutan camp a few days ago when he fell out with the KLO supremo, Jeevan Sinha. Realising that life would be difficult with the KLO shadowing him, he decided to respond to the Chief Minister's call.

Himadri, a resident of Haldibari in north Bengal, had been charged with murder of at least four persons. His brother, Srinivas, is president of the All-Kamtapur Students' Union.

militant shot at Gorumara

AVIJITSINHA OF CO Jalpaiguri, Oct. 29: A dash to safety through paddy fields ended in disaster for top KLO militant Suresh Roy when he was mowed down by security forces after a two-hour en-counter this afternoon on the fringes of the Gorumara National Park under Mainaguri police station.

Another militant accompanying Roy, known in the KLO as Himalaya, managed to escape. A constable was injured in the exchange of fire.

A Chinese-made 9 mm pistol with 18 rounds of ammunition was found on the slain militant.

This is the second time this month that security forces have engaged militants in a shootout in the district. On October 9.

two militants were gunned down at Pukhurigram village in Madhya Haldibari near the Indo-Bhutan border.

"Acting on a tip-off, the security forces — personnel from the district police, CRPF and the crack commando outfit rushed to Dakshin Kalimati on the Mainaguri-Ramsai Road near the Gorumara National Park," additional superintendent of police, Jalpaiguri, Anand Kumar said.


The security forces found the two militants scurrying through a paddy field to sneak into the reserve forest. On being challenged, the militants opened fire from their automatic weapons. "While one of the militants fell to our bullets, the other managed to escape. We recovered eight empty shells

from the spot," Kumar said.
Police believe the two rebels were part of a larger gang of KLO militants said to have been hiding in the area.

Jalpaiguri superintendent of police Siddh Nath Gupta is supervising the combing operations launched to arrest the other militants, who are suspected to have sneaked into the dense national park.

In Calcutta, inspector-general of police (law and order) Chayan Mukherjee said all police stations in the six north Bengal districts have been reinforced following the spate in extremist activities.

He said a constable of the state armed police was wounded when the militants opened fire on the police party around 12.45 this afternoon.



CK Pradhan Shot in Kalimpong

SILIGURI, Oct. 3. — Former GNLF leader CK Pradhan was shot dead in broad daylight around 1.40 p.m. at Darwa Dara, Kalimpong, by a gunman today. The assailant, reportedly a youth, fled towards Relli Road after shooting Pradhan from the back.

Pradhan was returning from a memorial service. He was in conversation with some people when the assailant shot him from close range. The bullet pierced Pradhan's body and came out through the belly, witnesses said. It was learnt that Pradhan tried to flee the spot but fell down when he reached RC Mintri road. He died on the way to a hospital.

The GNLF called a 72-hour bandh in Kalimpong from 6 p.m. today demanding immediate arrest of the culprit, Mr Dawa Pakhrin, the party's Kalimpong branch president, said.

The GNLF president, Mr Subash Ghisingh, convened a emergency meeting of the executive councillors in Darjeeling later today. "We are shocked at the turn of events," Mr IN Pradhan, an executive councillor of the GNLF, said.

Soon after the incident, shops and other establishments closed and vehicles went off the roads. Police have cordoned off the area and posted pickets at different points of the town to maintain law-and-order.

Pradhan, one of the founders of the GNLF, fell out of Mr Ghisingh's favour in 1994 after he was denied the vice-chairman's post in the DGHC.

Kalimpong, Oct. 3: Dissident Gorkha National Liberation Front leader Chandra Kumar Pradhan was shot dead in Kalimpong this afternoon by a lone assassin. The murder brought normal life to a grinding halt in the town and triggered tension in the Darjeeling subdivision.

Pradhan, an executive councillor for backward community welfare in the Darjeeling Gorkha Hill Council and a friend-turned-foe of DGHC chief Subash Ghistory welfing to the Dayword.

ing, was walking to the Darwadara market from Damber Chowk when he was shot in the back from point-blank range by a young man at 2 pm. He was rushed to hospital, where doctors declared

him dead on arrival.

The 50-year-old leader is survived by his wife, twin daughters and a son. One of his daughters

Condemning the killing, the GNLF has called a 72-hour strike in Kalimpong starting this evening. Immediately after the incident, normal life was thrown out of gear as shops and utility services closed down. Shocked people poured out on the streets.

"Daju (elder brother) was coming to the point at Darwadara where the road bifurcates and had stopped to talk to me. We were in the middle of a conversation, when he made a noise and collapsed," said Manik Sarkar, who still had bloodstains on his white shirt. "We saw the assasin, a youth of about 20, running away with a gun. He vanished towards Relli Road."

Sarkar, who owns a shop near the assassination spot, and a few other witnesses claimed the killer was not a local youth. "I saw his face once when he turned back before fleeing and I rushed after him. But he fled and we took Daju, who was bleeding profusely after collapsing on a staircase, to the hospital," said Sarkar.

Darjeeling superintendent of police Sanjay Chander, who rushed to Kalimpong, said the situation was under control. "The area has been cordoned off and heavy deployment of security forces has taken place throughout the sub-division. There has been no incident of violence till now."

He confirmed that the assassin was a young man in his early twenties, who fired only one round and fled after the operation.

Around 3.30 pm, Pradhan's wife Shila came out of the hospital, wailing that Ghising was behind the murder. Pradhan had fallen out with Ghising after the attempt on the DGHC chairman's life last year in which the former's hand was suspected.

Sept. 17: Police and militants armed with automatic weapons exchanged fire in two separate shootouts in Jalpaiguri district today, exactly a month after the Kamtapur Liberation Organisation gunned down five CPM workers at Dhupguri.

In a fierce gunbattle reported from Kumargram, hub of the Kamtapuris, police fired nearly 100 rounds at a group of nine Ulfa and KLO militants. The extremists, flushed out of a house in Chengamari village, escaped unhurt.

In the other incident, the police and a group of KLO activists fired at each other on the dry bed of the Jaldhaka river in Jalpaiguri. Here, too, the militants managed to flee. Tushar Roy, second-in-command in the militant outfit, was believed to be in the group.

Inspector general of police (law and order) Chayan Mukherjee said in Calcutta that the militants holed up in Chengamari were believed to have slipped into neighbouring Assam. He said the district police contacted their counterparts in Assam and sought help to flush out the militants.

Though district police sources confirmed the second shootout in Jalpaiguri, Mukherjee said he had no information.

The armed militants had forced their way into three houses at Chengamari village under the Kumargram police station early in the morning and demanded food at gunpoint.

As a police contingent, led by district superintendent Siddh Nath Gupta, entered the village late in the morning, the extremists came out of the houses and ran towards a nearby forest

While the security forces, including commandos, threw a ring and blocked all exits, the extremists pulled on black fatigues to hoodwink their pur-

The police and the militants exchanged heavy fire for nearly two hours. During a brief lull, the nine managed to sneak into the Sikia forest.

As the militants fled towards Paglahat, a CRPF contingent, called in by district authorities to deal with the heavily-armed extremists, arrived. But the security personnel failed to recognise the militants, mis-taking them for commandos from the police force.

It was too late by the time

the paramilitary forces realised the mistake. The militants had already crossed into Assam through the Tukra forest. They had also forded the Gholani and Sikiajhora rivers before entering Assam.

"We are sure the militants belonged to the KLO-Ulfa combine. They took advantage of the forest terrain and managed to cross over to Assam," superintendent Gupta said.

In the other incident, the police became suspicious when they spotted six men walking down the Jaldhaka riverbed in Dobabari-Bamandanga area of Jalpaiguri district. When challenged, the group opened fire at the police téam, which retaliated.

Police sources said the militants under cover of flying bullets managed to escape.

KPP hurls Value at Chief minister

Siliguri, Sept. 2: Kamtapur People's Party chief Atul Roy today branded chief minister Buddhadeb Bhattacharjee a "liar" and accused him of "misleading" people for linking the party with the Kamtapur Liberation Organisation.

Denying any connection with the militant outfit, Roy said the chief minister was indulging in "political chicanery" to tarnish the image of the party. He said the KPP is a political

organisation fighting democratically for recognition of the cultural identity and language of the Rajbanshis in north Bengal.

Referring to Bhattacharjee's speech in Dhupguri yesterday, Roy said: "He made an utterly baseless allegation that we are raising funds for the KLO. He seems to have lost his sense of discretion."

On the other hand, Roy said the CPM "squeezed" money from people "in the name of raising party funds".

ing party funds".

The KPP leadership, long living in the shadows of the KLO, is worried about the political fallout of the August 17 strike on the CPM office in Dhupguri. The leaders feel such attacks would alienate supporters and weaken the Kamtapuri movement.

KPP leaders said they fear a police crackdown on the political organisation on suspicion of its links with the KLO. They said the police are harassing KPP supporters in villages across the region.

Senior party leaders today held a meeting to discuss the fallout of the chief ninister's "false" charges. They felt his statements could provide the po-

lice a stick to beat the KPP with.

"The chief minister is a liar. Otherwise, he would not have tarred the KPP and KLO with the same brush," Roy said. "The police have fed him with such distorted facts and he relies too much on the force."

Roy said the chief minister's public remarks would embolden the police further to "pick up and torture the KPP supporters". The party will soon submit memorandums to deputy Prime Minister L.K. Advani and Governor Viren J. Shah against "police

atrocities on the pretext of tracking down the KLO militants".

The chief minister had yesterday accused the KPP and the KLO of misguiding the Rajbanshis.

"Where were

"Where were they when we were carrying out land reforms in north Bengal? It was the Left Front which had dis-

tributed land to the landless Rajbanshis," he had said at the rally in Dhupguri.

Bhattacharjee added that the local problems had to be solved "politically and not at gunpoint".

The KPP leadership today decided to launch a campaign against the police harassment. "This is the only way to fight the brute force of the police and save our workers who are being picked up and tortured," Roy said.

The party leadership fears that the police, taking advantage of the Dhupguri strike, would crack down on the KPP as it had emerged as a rival of the CPM in the region.

The leaders said the KPP had always eschewed violence and functioned "within the framework of the country's Constitution".

KLO part of **ISI terror** network: CM S fil si evel profer Niraj Lama in Dhupguri

Sept. 1. — Mr Buddhadeb Bhattacharjee today said KLO was part of an ISI-sponsored terrorist network and expressed disgust at the Centre's lukewarm attitude towards the state's concerns.

Addressing a gathering on his first visit here after five party members were gunned down on 17 August, the chief minister said he had talked to the Bhutanese King on insurgency. "I spoke to the King and have received an invitation for further talks," he said, indicating he might accept the invitation. The ultras have set up training camps in Bhutan.

"I recently appraised the Prime Minister and his deputy about our concerns. I asked Mr Advani: 'Why was the Centre not stopping Bhutan from allowing the insurgents to use its soil?'...How long can we tolerate...," Mr Bhattacharies said charjee said.

"We will not accept the murder of our comrades," he said. He warned businessmen against giving in to the ransom demands of the ultras.

Mr Bhattacharjee held the Ulfa, Naga insurgent groups and ISI responsible for the KLO's creation. "Like in Punjab, Kashmir and the Northeast, the ISI wants to destabilise

West Bengal."

Rubbishing the Kamtapur People's Party's claim of being the political front of the Raj-bonshis, he said the KPP had won two per cent votes in the last Assembly polls. "The Rajbonshis are with the LF."

After the meeting, Mr Bhattacharjee met DMs and SPs of six North Bengal districts.
Mr Anil Biswas, CPI-M state

secretary, said LF members had the "right to self-defence". He criticised the Opposition for failing to condemn the KLO attack. "The Opposition links insurgency to lack of development, but the KLO just wants to destabilise our government.

CPM sniffs KLO link within

Calcutta, Aug. 26: The CPM eadership will soon put under nicroscope the role allegedly played by a section of grassroots party workers in Jalpaiguri district in the spread of the Kamtapur Liberation Organisation.

The decision follows reports from the party's Jalpaiguri unit that suggest a group of partymen in Dhupguri and Moinaguri are enabling the KLO activists to expand their bases in Jalpaiguri.

Trinamul Congress chief Mamata Banerjee had recently alleged that a section of the CPM had helped create the KLO.

CPM district secretary Manik Sanyal has submitted a report on the Dhupguri incident in which five leaders were killed by KLO militants inside a party office.

Though Sanyal has not specifically mentioned the members maintaining links with KLO functionaries, he hinted that the role played by some of them should be examined thoroughly.

CPM insiders now want to know under what circumstances a section of the partymen are keeping touch with the KLO.

The party has information that some of its members are maintaining the KLO connection "under pressure and threats" from the militants. But there is a handful of CPM members who maintain secret links with the KLO on their own.

These members are not satisfied with the district leadership and are reportedly helping the KLO to make inroads in Jalapig uri, particularly in pockets where Rajbanshis are in the

It is learnt that the state CPM leadership will try to remove the misgivings of the disgruntled members and retain them in the party fold. If they refuse to go by directives, the leadership might ask the district unit to initiate measures against them.

CPM state secretary Anil Biswas and chief minister Buddhadeb Bhattacharjee will meet the district party functionaries when they visit Dhupguri on September 1 and try to measure up their sentiments.

The CPM state secretariat is preparing a note on the developments following the Dhupguri incident. It will be placed at the two-day state committee meeting beginning September 7

Apart from the initiative to tackle the disgruntled party members in the district, the sec retariat will also place its findings on the role played by police after the KLO attack on the Dhupguri office, party sources indicated.

Most of the CPM leaders in Jalpaiguri, including forest minister Jogesh Burman, have expressed their displeasure over the functioning of the district police after the KLO attack




It is learnt that the CPM has now realised it might be difficult to politically counter the KLO on its own in Jalpaiguri and pockets in north Bengal. The party's state leadership, therefore, plans to fight the outfit together with the Left Front partners.

Several Front constituents have alleged that the government's dependence on the police is gradually increasing and a section of police officers, taking advantage of the situation, is offering contradictory reports to Bhattachariee on various issues.

Attack reply to police torture, say parties

Pramod Giri Siliguri, August 19

THREE ORGANISATIONS have linked the Dhupguri attack to rampant violation of human rights by the police. They have asked the State Government to rein in the police or face the likelihood of more such attacks.

The Kamtapuri People's Party, the CPI-ML (Liberation) and the Association for Protection of Democratic Rights (APDR) have accused policemen of torturing villagers in Jalpaiguri and Cooch Behar districts on the pretext of combing for KLO militants. They have warned that more "incidents" would take place if the "rights violations" were not stopped.

KPP chief Atul Roy condemned Saturday's killings but held the CPI(M) responsible for the deterioration of law and order in North Bengal. "The police are torturing innocent Rajbongshi people and KPP supporters on the pretext of searching for militants. They are doing so at the behest of CPI(M) leaders. Innocent villagers in Jalpaiguri and Cooch Behar are agitated," Roy said.

The police did not dismiss the allegations. North Bengal Divisional Commissioner D Chakravarty said: "I won't say there are no human rights violations, but we are sensitising the police.

The CPI-ML (Liberation) echoed the rights-violation allegations against the State Government and police. Party secretary Sankar Das said police officers often went to Jalpaiguri villages like Barnis, Ramsai, Domani and Madav Danga and tortured innocent Rajbongshi people as well as KPP supporters.

His party had carried out an investigation on allegation of human rights violations in these villages and found the charges true. A report has been submitted to the District Magistrate of Jalpaiguri.

The APDR carried out investigations in Alipurduar on June 8 and June 9 and drew a similar inference. State secretariat member Abiranjan Bhaduri said the police tortured a Class VII student at Sitabari village after tying

Nagen Roy, a clerk in Salkumar High School, and his son were arrested at Munsipara. Roy was the KPP's candidate from Phalakatta in the last Assembly elections. Policemen went to Nagen's home in search of his son. When Nagen resisted, he too was arrested and tortured, Bhaduri said.

CM plans visit to **Dhupguri in Sept**

MINISTER Buddhadeb Bhattacharjee will visit Dhupguri next month following the KLO attack in which five CPI(M) members were killed.

"The DGP has gone to the spot. A search is on for the culprits. I will go there in September," Bhattacharjee told reporters here today when asked to comment on the latest situation at the North Ben-

IGP (law and order) Chayan Mukherjee said those responsible for the killings are yet to be nabbed.

Forward Bloc MP from Cooch Behar Amar Roy Pradhan today said there is a possibility that the ISI was involved in Saturday's attack.

'Though it has been reported that KLO militants are involved in the Dhupguri incident, the probability of an ISI link in the attack should not be ruled out," the Forward Bloc MP said.

Intelligence wake-up for State police

District tip-offs were

ignored as 'false alarms'

THE STRIKE has been a lesson for the police top brass in the State. It tells them that writing off alerts by the district Intelligence bureau (DIB) as "false alarms' can prove costly and that the KLO has changed tactics.

The Jalpaiguri DIB had filed a report in June stating that KLO militants were regrouping and planning major strikes. The report said senior Ulfa leaders had been carrying out reconnaissance in North Bengal along with the KLO for the past couple of months and detailed their movements.

But Jalpaiguri SP Siddinath Gupta reportedly ignored the report. "Most of the DIB reports are routinely ignored by senior officers, perhaps because the bureau is considered a punishment posting. Reports filed by the DIB personnel are generally ignored," said a senior police officer.

The DIB report said senior Ulfa leaders had been visiting parts of this trouble-torn district with the Kamtapuri militants from their bases in Bhutan. Top Ulfa leaders, including Rustom Chowdhury and Gautam Sil, had visited parts of Kumargram, Alipurduar and even Banarhaat — the homeground of the key architect of the recent attack Tom Adhikary — with some KLO re-

cruits in search of new shelters. The Ulfa-KLO militants had picked upon a new route through Newland in Assam to slip into Kumargram since the roads were no longer safe for their movement.

The report even specified that the joint team had planned to form small compact action squads to carry out effective strikes. These squads, the report said, had spread out over Panbari, Toofanganj and Kumargram. The Dhupguri attack has shown that the KLO has changed

Trinamool demands 'full-timer' for Home

Leader of the Opposition Pankaj Banerjee today reit-erated the demand for a "full time" Home Minister, citing the spurt in extremist attacks in the State.

The Trinamool leader said the Chief Minister, who is also in charge of the Home (Police) Department, is not being able to tackle the ongoing political battle in the districts. State CPI(M) secretary Anil Biswas, however, rubbished the argument. "Buddhadeb Bhattacharjee is a whole timer and he can manage things well.

That was a month after the DIB had filed its report. But by the time the district police took note of the increasing KLO activities, the militants had al-

Assam cops mull joint drive

Rahul Karmakar Guwahati, August 19

THE ASSAM Police is mulling the possibility of joint opera-tions after the killing of six CPI(M) members by Kamtapur Liberation Organisation (KLO) at Dhupguri on Saturday.

Senior Assam Police officers say cooperation between the two States is crucial in tackling militants of the Ulfa, NDFB and KLO, all operating from bases in south Bhutan.

'There have been instances of coordinated moves between the police force of the two States in the past, but those were halfhearted," a senior police officer said. "We hope that the West Bengal Government would be more serious this time on joint counter-insurgency operations."

Ever since the rise of the KLO. whose members are trained by the Ulfa and NDFB in Bhutan. the focus has shifted to the jungles of Siliguri, Jalpaiguri and Cooch Behar districts. The jungles have been used as corridors between Bhutan and Bangladesh. The NDFB militants in particular have escaped into the West Bengal jungles to dodge military action of the Unified Command. The rise of the KLO has helped Ulfa to find shelter in West Bengal.

"Assam and West Bengal have a common problem—a border with Bhutan. Though Bhutan is under pressure to push the militants out of its soil, it does not have the firepower to do so," the police official said.

Thimpu has been worried over the increasing activities of the KLO. The Bhutanese national daily Kuensel recently reported that the Himalayan kingdom "has become a hub for murderers, abductors and kidnappers".

"Activists of the KLO in league with Ulfa militants have reportedly shaken the planters in Dooars tea belt area with threats of extortion, abduction and murder," it said. 'The abducted Indian victims

are brought to camps in Bhutan by their captors, from where they negotiate for ransom," Kuensel said. Bhutan is reported to have turned a blind eye to

Bandh brings North Bengal to a halt

LIFE CAME to a grinding halt today in the three North Bengal districts of Jalpaiguri, Cooch Behar and Dareeling in response to the CPI(M)'s bandh call to protest Saturday's KLO attack on its party office in Dhupguri. The party had called a 12-hour bandh each in Cooch Behar and Darjeeling and a 24-hour bandh in Jalpaiguri.

The bandh was complete in all three districts except in the hill sub-divisions of Darjeeling. No untoward incident was reported from any of the districts.

All State and Central Government offices remained closed, with only skeletal staff manning the District Magistrates' offices in Jal-paiguri and Cooch Behar. The employees, wore black badges.

Public and private transport remained off the roads, with all shops and business establishments keeping their shutters down. Educational institutions, banks and private establishments too remained closed.

However, train services were not affected as they had been kept out of the bandh's purview. Jalpaiguri DM Utpal Bhadra said tea gardens had responded to the bandh call.

The bandh was total even in interior areas of the district. 'Even in remote villages, schools and shops remained closed and we have reports that many farmers did not go out to their fields," a police officer at Jalpaiguri said.

The North Bengal State Transport Corporation did not ply buses on any route. Emergency services were affected in the district. The bandh, CPI(M) leaders claimed, was total and spon-

Warm-up before big battle, warns Kamtapuri leader

KAMTAPURI PEOPLE's Party (KPP) chief Atul Roy says the terrorist attacks in North Bengal are only the beginning of a bloody battle that will hit the region before the panchayat elec-

The CPI(M)-led Left Front Government is bound to face the wrath of the KPP and the KLO if Rajbongshis and acknowledges their Statehood demand, he said.

"One burst in Dhupguri and the State Government is rattled. said Roy. "We want to send a clear message to Chief Minister Buddhadeb Bhattacharjee—the fireball will reach the goal. The Rajbongshis have not benefited from development projects. Not a single son of the soil got even a minibus permit here.

The KPP. 500 of whose leaders are behind bars, are regrouping and want to build a base in Malbazar Haldibari, Methliganj, Jalpaiguri Dhubguri, Alipurduar, Toofanganj, Dinhata, Mathabhanga, Cooch Behar, Islampur, Balurghat and Raiganj.
Roy said an elite force trained

in Purulia has been deployed to arrest and torture KPP workers. is largely to prevent the KPP from controlling the panchayats in the villages.

"It is this power struggle that sparked the clash. But we will start with the panchayats polls and end with a Kamtapuri State comprising Jalpaiguri, Cooch Behar, Malda, North and South Dinajpur and adjacent areas dominated by Kamtapuris.

"The CPI(M), through its control of panchayats and coordination committees, is ruling us by force. But the Rajbongshi farmers, the middle class and intelligentsia who have lost their land and are losing plum posts in Government units will not tolerate this indifference for long either.'

Though the KPP was a democratic organisation and believed KLO is a banned militant wing of the Kamtapuris and has the same goals.

"The KLO frequently strikes in Dhupguri, Kumbhagram and Alipurduar because of its strong base there. It has sophisticated arms like AK-47/56, 9mm guns and grenades received from the Ulfa and the ISI. But we have no



links with them.

"The KPP is a democratic outfit and the KLO works from underground. But since the goal is: the same, the State Government: is bound to crumble and accede to the demand for a Kamtapuri State as the KPP and the KLO mount their pressure," said Roy.

Brief but bloody trail of terror

THE KAMTAPURI Liberation Organisation (KLO) has run up a long list of victims in just six years of its existence.

In fact, its tryst with violence began quite early, just two years after it was formed, in mid-1996, by hardliners in the Kamtapuri People's Party Students' Front who wanted to replace the KPP's demand for a separate State with that of a separate country.

The KLO started off by creating panic among the CPI(M) cadres, since it sees the ruling party as its main opposition. Schoolteachers affiliated to the CPI(M) were a soft target.

Tea planters and businessmen of the region became their prime targets for abductions and extortions. In Jalpaiguri district itself, the KLO's inventory of depredations is quite exhaustive.

The three most spectacular kidnappings were those of Roshanlal Garg in 1999, Om Prakash Agarwal the next year and Deepankar Ghosh in October 2000. All three were tea planters.

Garg was released after a few months in captivity when, according to Intelligence sources, his family paid the KLO Rs 80 lakh as ransom. Agarwal was abducted in early 2000 and his son, Gopal, who tried to resist, was murdered. Agarwal was released after his family reportedly paid nearly Rs 1 crore as ransom.

Ghosh, a lawyer who had close links with the CPI(M),

was gunned down at Kadamtala near Siliguri after he steadfastly refused to meet the repeated extortion demands of the militants. The outfit has made a whopping Rs 75 crore in four years from extortion of tea planters in the Hills.

CPI(M) members of Jalpaiguri who have fallen to the KLO's bullets include Nitai Das, Khagen Roy, Dilip Roy (of the DYFI), Sunil Dutta, Pranesh Pal, Subodh Majumder, Nitai Bose, Gayanath Roy, Swapan Sarkar and Rohini Adhikari (RSP). The KLO is also suspected to have abducted Pradeep Sarkar, son of Assam Congress MLA Chandan Sarkar, from Jateshwar Market in Falakata, Jalpaiguri.

Before the August 17 attack on the CPI(M) zonal office in Dhupguri, the most spectacular operation carried out by the KLO was the landmine blast at Bhutanghat inside the Buxa Tiger Reserve. The blast left six jawans injured.

The KLO militants torched the Bhutanghat forest bungalow where the CRPF was supposed to establish a camp. This operation was carried out with the help of the Ulfa.

But the KLO has also suffered reverses. On May 23, two KLO militants - Sukumar Burman and Ramani Roy were gunned down by the police near Hatinala river along the India-Bhutan border.

Several others were arrested. They include Chiranjib Roy, the chief of the outfit's Belacoba-Saudangi unit and KLO linkman Madan Roy.

10 action squads for new strike plan

THE KAMTAPURI Liberation Organisation (KLO) has 10 "action squads" working under senior leader Tom Adhikary alias Joydeb Roy as part of its new strategy for effective strikes.

The action squads comprise six to eight members, all of them trained at the Ulfa camps in Bhutan. "The best of the lot in three batches were picked up for these squads," a defence Intelligence officer posted in North Bengal told *Hindustan Times*.

These squads have fanned out to the remote villages dominated by the Rajbongshis. "The local people are anyway their families, relatives or supporters. So this makes it difficult to trace them.'

The KLO militants have stopped carrying arms except during operations, and travel on bicycles or on foot. "This is exactly what the Ulfa had done in recent times after realising that it made them less conspicuous, said the officer.

Interrogation of KLO leader Suresh Roy, who surrendered earlier this year, had revealed that the group's "commander-in-chief" Jeevan Singh was its undisputed leader. "He's revered by the cadres and other secondrung leaders," said the officer.

The second-rung comprises 'deputy commander-in-chief' Tamir Das and Tom Adhikary. 'The two are confidants of

Jeevan Singh. Adhikary usually plots the operations and liaises with the Ulfa though Jeevan Singh is the pointman. Jeevan has a good rapport with Ulfa commander-in-chief Paresh Barua and its Bhutan commander Raju Baruah. He and Raju ex-

Police suspect Ulfa hand in KLO strike

Dhupguri, Aug. 18: As the numbed town woke up to the deadly KLO strike, police today saw the hand of Ulfa militants as well in the killing of five CPM leaders that came amid heightened security in the wake of Independence


"We suspect it was a joint KLO-Ulfa operation, going by the way the attack was carried out. Evewitness accounts confirm our suspicions," said Jalpaiguri additional superintendent of police Anand Kumar. He added that the police are keeping a watch over all routes to Bhutan and neiğhbouring Cooch Behar where the militants might escape.

Intelligence officials did not rule out "a pact" between the KLO and Ulfa militants to attack "common" targets. Both groups, incidentally, have their bases in Bhutan and run their training camps there. "From preliminary investigations, we have found out that there were five to six militants belonging to the KLO accompanied by a lone Ulfa cadre." Kumar said.

After a night's hunt across the Jalpaiguri district, Kumar said they had detained four people, but did not give details, "We are interrogating them." was all he said.

In Calcutta, director-general of police D.C. Vajpai said four people were arrested in connection with the killings. Vajpai met senior officers, including inspector-general of police (north) Bhupinder Singh, and asked them to beef up security for politicians on militants' hitlist.

Vajpai, who is leaving for Dhupguri tomorrow, asked the North Bengal Armed Police in Siliguri to send reinforcements



to Jalpaiguri for a districtwide called by the CPM to protest combing operation.

Police sources said they suspected the assailants included KLO action squad chief Joydeb Roy, popularly known in the region as Tom Adhikarv.

Revenge for fiancée arrest

Dhupguri, Aug. 18: Last evening's daring strike has again proved that the banned Kamatapur Liberation Organisation (KLO) has enough firepower to take on the CPM.

If intelligence reports are to be believed, the outfit's selfstyled commander-in-chief Jeevan Singh alias Tamir Das has been seething since the arrest of his fiancée Bharati Das, who is also the chief of the Kamtapur Women's Rights Forum. Das was arrested on August 5.

Bharati, like Singh, is a well-trained rebel. She has reportedly undergone sophisticated arms training at the Ulfa area command camp in south Bhutan.

Intelligence reports suggest that before her arrest, the firebrand women's forum leader was primarily responsible for recruiting cadre for both the KLO and the women's wing of the armed outfit.

Faced with an acute funds crunch and police crackdown, the KLO was lying low for the past few months and "looking for an opportune moment to strike terror".

"Last evening's attack was more retaliatory in nature, to reassert their might. It was engineered to spread panic among people, to show that they meant business. The CPM worke-

rs, whom the KLO considers its sworn enemies, were the most likely target. It was similar to the terror strikes a couple of years ago," a senior intelligence official told The Telegraph.

"Besides, the outfit was desperate to exhibit its newly-acquired firepower and sophisticated arms training. It was also a clear message to the law enforcers that the militants can strike back at the establishment with vengeance," the official added.

The surprise strike has made both the intelligence and security forces wary of further attacks. "It is the handiwork of the Ulfa-KLO combine." said a senior official.

"We fear that several highlytrained members of these two outfits are at large in Jalpaiguri and Cooch Behar districts. According to our information, the rebels have chalked out a series of deadly strikes. A 31member militant squad has fanned out in the area. They are holed up at different hideouts,' he added.

Singh, too, is believed to have entered north Bengal from his Bhutan hideout at Tintala after the arrest of Bharati.

The commander-in-chief had reportedly planned last evening's strike. Tom Adhikary, as Singh is popularly known, and his deputy Tushar are believed to have been in the squad.

SILIGURI/JALPAIGURI, Aug. 18. — The CPI-M's Jalpaiguri district committee has threatened retaliation a day after the KLO attack on the party's Dhupguri zonal office.

The district committee secretary, Mr Manik Sanyal, spoke of "jehad against the KLO". "We have tolerated their attacks so far. But the time has come to retaliate ... If they are so inhuman, we will answer them," he said today.

The death toll in the attack has risen to five with

two more persons succumbing to injuries in North Bengal Medical College and Hospital. The condition of party members Mr Bhabesh Sarkar (at NBMCH) and Mr Chandan Sarkar (at Paramount Nursing Home, Siliguri) is serious.

The attack has sent shock waves through the

region, particularly among CPI-M members who have been targets of the KLO — armed wing of the KPP. Till now, however, the ultras were targeting their victims in isolation. The Jalpaiguri DM, Dr Subroto Gupta, admitted that "Intelligence failure" had led to the incident.

A 24-hour bandh has been called in Jalpaiguri and a 12-hour bandh in Cooch Behar tomorrow. In Siliguri, the CPI-M district committee has called a 12-hour bandh tomorrow. The Darjeeling district CPI has supported the bandh. "There are no words to condemn the barbaric incident," Mr Ujjal Chowdhary, district CPI secretary, said.

The chief minister has asked the DGP, Mr Dinesh Bajpai, to visit the region tomorrow. Security has been beefed up at the CPI-M office in Siliguri and the party held protest rallies at many places today.

Mr Mridul Dey, CPI-M state committee member, and urban development minister Mr Asok Bhattacharya rushed to Dhupguri today. The town wore a deserted look because of the bandh called by the local CPI-M unit.

According to eyewitnesses, yesterday's operation lasted five minutes. The militants came on bicycles and fled through Surya Sen Colony. Incidentally, the local police station is hardly 200 metres away from the party office.

Amid claims that the gunmen had fled to mili-

tant camps in Bhutan, a senior police officer said six KLO "linkmen" had been detained for interrogation. No arrests have been made so far. The commissioner of Jalpaiguri division, Mr D Chakraborty, said a red alert has been sounded in Cooch Behar and Darjeeling and the Bhutan and

Bangladesh borders are being monitored.

The Dhupguri CPI-M zonal committee secretary and former forest minister, Mr Banamali Roy, expressed "security fears for the public". The Jalpaiguri superintendent of police, Mr SN Gupta, was not available for comment. The DM expressed "surprise" over the fact that the militants managed to flee though they came on bicycles. "This despite the police having cars."

A high-level meeting was held at Writers' Buildings today which was attended by Mr Bhupinder Singh, I-G (North Bengal), among others, adds SNS from Kolkata. It was learnt that security will be beefed up in district committee offices of the CPI-M, especially in North Bengal.

Telltale Ulfa signs in attack

SATURDAY'S ATTACK on the CPI (M) zonal office at Dhupguri was master-minded and executed by a 31-member "action squad" of the Kamtapuri Liberation Organisation (KLO) and bears the trademark of an Ulfa operation.

The militants sneaked into Darjeeling from Bhutan in the last week of July. Intelligence agencies had tipped off the State police on their movement and alerted the State administration to the possibility of a strike on "soft targets". Senior officers of central

Intelligence agencies told Hindustan Times that the information about the en-try of the KLO militants was provided to the State police in the first week of August. "We also told police Intelligence sources feel KLO couldn't have executed such an operation alone... The Ulfa must have helped in planning the operation and lent the arms

that these militants, who received arms training at Ulfa camps in Bhutan, were spreading out into Jalpaiguri and Cooch Behar districts, and were planning a major operation," a senior Intelligence officer said. We had information that the operation would be carried out at a stronghold of the KLO and KPP."

Dhupguri is a

stronghold. Intelligence agencies are certain that the Ulfa was involved in the opera-tion. "This sort of operation could not have been planned by just the KLO. The Ulfa had, at the very

least, helped in planning the whole operation and must have also provided strategic help," the officer said. The arms used for the operation could have been lent to the KLO by the Ulfa.

"There are a number of Ulfa activists hiding in Darjeeling, Cooch Behar and Jalpaiguri. They were definitely involved. Some hitmen from Ulfa camps in

Bhutan may have accompanied the KLO action squad," he said.

Senior Army officers who have traced the Assam-based militant outfits organisational structure and operations for years

say the operation smacks Ulfa's involvement. "This is exactly the way the Ulfa used to carry out strikes in Assam. The modus operandi, from preliminary reports and ob-servations, is the same as that of the Ulfa's strikes at Congress workers and offices in Assam in the early 1990s or against the Asom Gana Parishad later," said a senior officer who has commanded counter-insurgency operations in As-

CPM \ bleeds in reprisal

Fourteen CPM workers were injured in the attack which penetrated the tight security cover over Jalpaiguri. Sources said the incident took place around 6.45 pm, when a meeting was on in the office, located in Dhupguri bazaar. Saturday being the weekly market day, the area was

Quoting witnesses. sources said three militants, armed with automatic weapons, pedalled up to the front of the office, stormed in and opened fire before escaping on three motorcycles that their colleagues were waiting with.

Dhupguri zonal committee members Gopal Chaki, Dulal Roy, Gosai Sil and Ganesh Rai were killed, CPM state secretary Anil Biswas said. Chaki was also the Jalpaiguri zilla parishad member in charge of PWD. Unconfirmed reports said at least

five CPM workers were killed. Biswas blamed the KLO for the "planned strike" and said the party would hold statewide protests tomorrow A bandh has been called in Jalpaiguri on

Senior district police officials, including superintendent of police Siddh Nath Gupta, have rushed to the spot. The area has been cordoned off.

The strike is significant in the wake of intelligence reports that a 31-member "action squad" of KLO and the United Liberation Front of Asom (Ulfa) militants had entered Jalpaiguri, Cooch Behar and Darjeeling in the first week of August.

The reports said the militants, armed with automatic weapons, including AK-47 and AK-56 assault rifles and 9mm pistols, had split into six groups and fanned out in Jalpaiguri, Cooch Behar and Darjeeling districts, where they were planning a series of strikes.

The attack follows the arrest of Kamtapur Women Rights' Forum chief Bharati Das, said to be the fiancée of self-styled KLO commander-in-chief Jeevan Singh, in the first week of August. Police and security agencies had been apprehensive that the KLO-Ulfa combine would carry out a

series of retaliatory strikes.
Witnesses said KLO action squad chief Joy Deb Roy alias Tom Adhikary, his deputy Tushar Roy and Bijoy Roy alias Kitab Das were among the six involved in the attack. Ulfa activists were also involved, they added.
