- **4.** What is the secularisation thesis according to Harvey Cox? How does he explain its dramatic failure in the twentieth century?

- **6.** Analyse how Coetzee's *Foe* may be read as a narrative representation of silences and silencing.

- **8.** Critically comment on Tagore's idea of kingship as explored in *Raktakarabi*.
- **9.** Examine how Lessing and Gordimer represent the domain of knowledge in their short stories 'No Witchcraft for Sale' and 'Comrades'.
- **10.** In Walcott's *New World* eco-poetics, the Caribbean landscape emerges as a dominant presence. Countering and subsuming colonial epistemologies. Discuss.
