Compare how the feminist concerns and criticism changes and/or remains the same through time and society.

- b) In what many ways does Pepetela problematize and expose the paradoxical nature of the idea of nationhood in the novel Mayombe? Is the narrative technique used in the novel in tandem with this motive? Discuss with close reference to the text.
- 3. a) Discuss with reference to three stories from three languages the relationship between colonialism, post-colonia economic dependence, and gender relations in the contacts between Africa and the Western countries.

1. a) The difference in the treatment of the politics of 'home' and 'belonging' in *The Suns of Independence* and *Season of Migration to the North* shows that the 'postcolonial' is not a watertight category exhibiting fixed characteristics. Do you agree? Comment critically citing references from the two novels.

#### Or

b) The narrator in *The Suns of Independence* is the custodian of collective memory and history and often express ideological and evaluative function through didactic interventions and judgements of characters, actions and situations. Whereas, the narrator himself is disillusioned by the changing cultural and political realities in *Season of Migration to the North*. Attempt a comparative analysis of the two narratorial voices
