2. (a) Rodo's Ariel presents an idealized view of intellectualism and posits it as the solution to the problems of the modern world. However, his ideas have been criticized for being elitist and out of touch with reality. Write a short essay explaining your take on the essay.

- (b) Retamar's *Caliban* is a continuation of as well as a challenge to the views expressed by Rodo in *Ariel* regarding Latin American identity in the context of Spanish and US hegemony in cultural politics. Examine this dichotomy with a close reading of both essays.
- 3. (a) Paulo Freire in *Pedagogy of the Oppressea*, argues that traditional education perpetuates oppression and calls for a revolutionary approach to teaching. How does Freire conceptualize oppression within the educational system and how does he propose to dismantle these oppressive structures through his concept of liberatory education?

(b) In the play Death and the Maiden, Dorfman emphasizes the necessity of articulation of uncomfortable truths for the survival of the fledgling democracy of Chile in 1990. Do you think his insistence on 'truth' finds resonance in any other author/text you have read as part of this course? Elaborate with references to the text(s).
